Instructions

This project provides you with the opportunity to shape personal interest into a robust research project. You have broad scope in terms of topic and mode of presentation but there are some key elements and criteria that must be met:

- 1. CONSULTATION: Each student must submit a Curiosity Project Proposal before the end of WEEK 6. Any projects completed without submission of the proposal will not be graded. Your proposal must include the following:
 - A brief description of the proposed project;
 - A working research question;
 - A statement indicating how the project relates to the focus and concerns of the course;

- A preliminary list of sources or types of materials you will be including.
- 2. SCHOLARSHIP: This is a RESEARCH PROJECT. Therefore, you must include in your project appropriate and relevant sources. Depending on the nature of the project, sources may include popular culture, news media, personal anecdote etc., but all projects must include substantial interaction with **scholarly sources** in areas relevant to the focus of the course. **All sources must be documented**, including personal interviews, materials from image searches etc. Consult with the Librarian. You will submit a preliminary bibliography for grade (see the Assignment Description for the Annotated Bibliography);
- 3. PRESENTATION: The type of project you choose will determine the best format for presentation. However, you must provide **the equivalent of 2000 words of analysis** and discussion. You will also be presenting your project to the class in WEEK 12, so you will need to consider a format that will be accessible in a gallery-type environment.

Some Suggested Topics to get you thinking

- Typography, orthography, graffiti;
- Build a language and a cultural history;
- A Day in the Life of a Language: personal socio-ethnography;
- Awake journaling (observations about language in the wild);
- Media analysis: spin, usage;
- Dictionaries and lexicography: E.g. make your own dictionary;
- Concept-mapping: semantic fields, etymology, language family etc.;
- Book-making, illumination, history of the book;
- Language and empire;
- Language and civil rights;
- Translation;
- Language loss and recovery;
- Expansion or "deep dive" on any of the topics covered in class.

- 4. CURIOSITY PROJECT in some form that can be transported to my office for assessment.
- Electronic submissions (websites, blogs, music etc.) may be sent in an easily-accessed format by email. Use the following template for both the email subject line and the file: ENGL 390 w2020 CURIOSITY PROJECT by YOUR NAME;
- Traditional text formats (essays etc.) must be submitted in HARDCOPY.
- 5. WORKS CITED in proper MLA format.

Assessment

- Clear, analytical research question of the appropriate scope for the assignment;
- Clear, analytical thesis with evident relevance to the study of language in its cultural context;
- Appropriate and effective presentation format;
- Appropriate use of research;
- Coherent synthesis and articulation of key elements, terms etc.;
- Appropriate illustration of concepts;
- Evidence of application of relevant conceptual tools, definitions etc. to the topic;
- Concision, clear language, paragraph and sentence structure;
- Tidiness, care for presentation;
- Accurate MLA citation and documentation;
- Evidence of deep engagement and intellectual curiosity.
